

# **Secondary News**

Year 9 and 10 have been busy contemplating their subject selections for 2019. There has been much discussion about Vocational Education and Training (VET) subjects in comparison to the Category A subjects for Year 11 and 12. VET courses provide a pathway into wide range of occupations. Studying a VET course at school can even make it easier to get that all important part time job to help you get through your university study. VET programs in schools are laying foundation for the workforce of tomorrow, developing skilled and adaptable employees for the future. VET courses are delivered by



teachers that have been trained in the course and also have industrial experience in that field of expertise.

Traditionally students who are wanting an ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) in order to attend University do not study VET subjects. To gain an ATAR students need to study a minimum of 10 units (most subjects are worth 2 units) of examinable subjects in Year 12 (they study a minimum of 12 units in Year 11). VET subjects are examinable if the student requests to sit the exam but only 2 units of VET can count towards an ATAR. A student who is going for an ATAR can still study 2 VET subjects (4 units) if they wish.

Although VET courses are generally run in Year 11 and 12, students can commence the course in Year 10 if there school decides to offer this option. The advantage of starting in Year 10 is that it allows the student to focus more on their other subjects in Year 12. Currently we have a number of Year 10 students doing VET Automotive. This week I spoke to the Year 9 and 10 students about VET and the possibility of running VET courses in Year 10 2019. If you have a child in Year 9 or 10 I encourage you to start the conversation with them about senior schooling. If you have any questions about VET courses or subject selection in general please contact me.

The VET courses being offered at Bundarra Central School in 2019 are-

- Certificate II in Agriculture (Primary Industries)
- Certificate II in Business (Business Services)
- Certificate II in Construction Pathways
- Certificate II in Hospitality (Food and Beverage)
- Delivered by TAFE Certificate II in Automotive

Notes went home this week for two great opportunities. Girls in year 7 to 10 have received notes for the Girls Resilience Workshop on Friday 21<sup>st</sup> September. She will receive bees wax wraps (an environmentally friendly glad wrap) that students have made as a prize. These are easy to make at home! We recommend using these as an alternative to glad wrap."

# **How to make Bees Wax Wrap**

Materials needed:

Beeswax - grated

**Fabric** 

Scissors (to cut the paper


**Baking Paper** 

**Baking pan** 

**Brush** of some sort (optional)

# Instructions:

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to its lowest setting (or 200F).
- 2. Using scissors, cut your fabric into the shapes you want.
- 3. Cover the baking pan with baking paper lay your fabric down, and sprinkle the fabric with beeswax. Put it in the oven and let it melt for 5-10 minutes.
- 4. Once it looks like all the wax has melted, use the brush to sweep the wax around and ensure all edges and corners have also been saturated.
- 5. Then peel the fabric up, wave it around in the air for a few seconds for the wax to harden (be mildly careful, although it shouldn't burn you), and then hang it over the back of a chair or something to wait for it to fully dry. Then do it all again!

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
